Talk by Kevin Alviti "Preserving the Harvest from your Garden"

On Monday 4th November we were truly entertained with a lively talk from Kevin Alviti. Kevin grew up on a large farm and loved his upbringing and way of life so much that he was determined to give his own family the same opportunity. He certainly achieved this as he now has a 5 acre smallholding in Malvern, a wife and three children and they all seem to be living the dream!

Kevin is a stay at home dad who looks after his three children, runs a playgroup and a scout group as well as working part time as a carpenter to make ends meet. Of course he also gives garden club talks!

He is striving to be self reliant and believes in a traditional way of life and family values. He grows fruit and vegetables, raises some of his own meat and makes his own wine. He talked about how he preserves his harvest so that the food he grows can be used all year round. It is important to store the food in the correct conditions and the right temperature and we learned about all the many ways to preserve all types of food. Kevin talked about canning, bottling, dehydration, fermentation, pickling, freezing and drying as well as making jams and chutney not forgetting wine making using many different vegetables. We sampled a few of the interesting things he bought along in jars including dried fruit which his children eat instead of sweets.

We could also purchase wooden garden items he had made from reclaimed pine.

Kevin was so enthusiastic about his way of life and he has many more ideas that he would like to achieve. Mansel garden club wishes him luck in his future projects.

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Polecat.. *Mustela Putorius*

The first time I saw a Polecat was unfortunately a dead one on the road. Such a beautiful mammal with his mask round his eyes and quite a thick tail. Since then I've seen them a number of times around Hereford., Usually at night jumping off the road into the hedge but I have seen them now and the during the day again seeking the safety and shelter of the hedgerow. We're very lucky that in Herefordshire we have a good population which



is hopefully now spreading throughout Britain

This mammal probably colonised mainland England from continent Europe at the end of the last ice age around 9,500 years ago. Although they reached the mainland they did not reach Ireland.

The Polecat is a member of the Mustelid family of which includes Stoat and Badgers. They live for around 5 years and are solitary in nature and require a square kilometre of home range. Mainly nocturnal you will mainly see them at night, but sometimes if the female is hunting for her kits she will be seen in the day. Radio tracking has shown they particularly favour hedgerows, woodland, riverbanks and in the winter farmland and buildings. They favour lowland countryside and generally will not go above 500m. If threatened they will emit a very pungent musky odour from scent glands at the base of their tails, they also use this to mark territory. Polecats are polygamous (males will have more than one mate). In May/June they will have one litter of around 5-10 kits. They will be weaned after weeks and fully grown in 3 months.

Polecats will interbreed with ferrets and the young tend to have lighter fur on their backs and whiter faces. Their diet mainly consists of rabbits, rats, frogs, birds and snakes. *Mustela Putorius* means foul smelling musk bearer. The old English name is Foulmart which distinguishes it from Sweetmart or Pine Martin that has no foul odour. The name Polecat comes from Poule-chat (chicken cat) for its perceived love for chicken. Unfortunately they were reviled as chicken killers and in the middle ages they were declared vermin and a bounty was paid by church wardens for each one killed. By 1915 these mammals had been eradicated from most of mainland Britain by gamekeepers. They were basically on the brink of extinction.

The only remaining areas where they were still established was Wales, Herefordshire and Shropshire. Reduced predator control after WW II led to a slow recovery and then the cessation of commercial rabbit trapping in 1950 further eased the pressure of so called accidental trapping.

The conservation status is now Protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 that prohibits the killing or taking of these animals. It is also an offence to trap them even accidentally.

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
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
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- Twas the month after Christmas, and all through the house

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How to survive a heart attack when alone and in such pain.

A person whose heart is beating improperly and who begins to feel faint should help themselves survive by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before each cough and the cough must be deep and prolonged as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest

Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it to regain a normal rhythm. In this way heart attack victims can get to help or to a hospital.


I like to know the person that I'm dealing with and not just the 'seller'. It creates bonds and adds to my circle of friends

Dear Friends,

When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God... There was also a prophet, Anna... Coming up to them at that very moment, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were looking forward to the redemption of Jerusalem. Luke 2:27-28, 36, 38

Every year the avalanche of cards betrays the mixed messages of the British Christmas. Beside the usual themes of winter, snow, holly, robins and stars, there are the innumerable ways of portraying the birth narratives of Jesus, loosely featuring stable, manger, assorted animals, shepherds and magi.

But Luke's carefully chosen and recorded stories of those who saw and worshipped this baby, who welcomed his coming into the world, include two elderly witnesses who are almost always left out. Simeon and Anna, unlike the shepherds and the astrologers, are simply not on the cards – they are the missing worshippers of the newborn king.

Jesus was still a tiny baby when he was taken to the temple by his parents to fulfil the requirements of the law. Simeon and Anna, prompted by the Holy Spirit, were there when he was carried in. Luke tells us that the Holy Spirit had revealed to Simeon that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. In all the bustle of the busy temple, full of families fulfilling their obligations, buying pigeons, going through the required rituals, these two elderly devout believers, waiting for the promise of a Messiah, saw one family with one small baby and knew he was the Christ. For most of the hundreds of others in the crowded temple, the idea that this newborn Galilean baby should be the Messiah was not on the cards – not what they expected and probably not what they would have wanted.

All around us the business and festive demands of Christmas, like the temple bustle, has God's promise of a Saviour hidden somewhere at its heart. May the Holy Spirit open our eyes to reveal once more the amazing truth of God incarnate as a small baby, and may he open the eyes of those around us for whom this is simply not on the cards.
