

Mansel Lacy & Yazor Parishes Brass Band

Organised and taught by the Vicar of the two parishes (Rev. W. Leeming), October, 1938. No members had ever played before, and with one exception music has had to be taught from the first rudiments.

In spite of this the band played in the district Caroling Xmas 1938, after about two months' tuition.

I never saw this bird much until we moved here and now have one as a regular neighbour. I've spent quite some time watching a juvenile that's been finding it's feet on the ground and telegraph poles by us this summer.

These birds pair for life and while they are very antisocial outside of the breeding season they will live nearby and re-establish their pair bond in March through loud calls and courtship. The male will excavate their holes in soft wood or rotten trees. These holes can last 10yrs or more. They have soft weak bills unlike our other woodpeckers and can't chisel into hard wood or drum to communicate.

They will have one brood of 5-7 eggs in May. Once fledged like other birds each parent takes half the young to show them where food can be found.

The Male and Female look very similar but males will have a red moustachial stripe while the female has none or is black. Juveniles have very streaky black and white plumage.

These birds are very vocal as I'm sure most of you here have heard. Their loud laughing call is known as a yaffle. Which leads to other names they are known by. We have the Yaffle, laughing Betsy, weather cock, rain bird, wet bird, nickel, Jack eikle and the best Nicker pecker. Apparently they had the mystical ability to summon rain... Who knew!?

They do not feature prominently in our human culture but we can't forget Professor Yaffle in our beloved Bagpus! For the rest of you woodpecker cider!


Postcards from Life

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Wildflower Meadow

When we moved here in 2016 I knew I wanted a meadow. But I honestly did not think I'd have room for one. Round the back (a few of you will know) is a small patch of grass and a big mess where a patio once was. This was taken up a few years ago and the result was just left whilst we were busy elsewhere. So our main jobs this year were to put up a small conservatory, sort the fence out and just generally sort the back garden out ready for vegetables and chickens, which I've heard is a cracking combination! In March we started and the conservatory went up in no time even with our shocking measuring abilities. Result! Now in my head this was going to be surrounded with wildflowers. So I started looking into it. Seemed simple enough, the first thing was to

take the grass up, this patio was had been lawn to make sure coming up. While over, most of it weeks by the time was happy I'd got out. Bad soil is wildflowers but for different types sandy. As mine I just dug it over to and left it gravely. but I ignored that down too much in



as it used to be a easier than if it and then leave it weeds aren't I was digging it got left for 3 I'd done it all so most weed roots best there are mixes of soils like clay or was mainly gravel bring some soil up The edges are clay and just didn't dig those areas. Once

we'd got it fairly flat I literally threw some seeds down along with some builders sand then left it. You don't have to but we did water a few times a week because it was so hot. The seeds were from a meadow company and literally cost me £20. You actually scatter it fairly thinly so a small amount goes a long way. A good meadow mix will have annuals, perennials and grasses. 4 weeks and David is asking if he can turf it yet or put decking down. I admit I was a bit worried how it was growing. 6 weeks later and we had quite a carpet of green and our first flowers. End of July we have some seed heads but apart from lots of poppies coming through it has not stopped flowering. When we sit in the conservatory it's like sitting in a painting. It's incredible and yes David stopped trying to turf it over when the first flowers came through! I won't cut it now until the end of August, and then probably by hand to cut it higher than a mower could. The cuttings need to be left over night then scooped up the next day. Weeds still come through but are easily pulled up and removed before they seed down. After that it's mowing to keep it fairly short untill next March when the mowing stops again. So for now it's just sitting back and enjoying our live painting. Angle & David Starling

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Foxley Group Parish Council

Like many aspects of daily life, the activities of the Parish Council have been curtailed by Covid restrictions. The Council normally meets four times a year but the recent, socially distanced, meeting on September 16th, was the first since February. During the lockdown period the Council provided a conduit for support for residents who were self-isolating, for example connecting with council services and prescription collection.

The meeting approved the annual precept for 2021/22 at £2500, which remains unchanged from the current year. The precept is paid through the council tax and residents will see their portion itemised on their annual bill. Half of this money is used to pay the Lengthsman for routine maintenance of verges, ditches and drains on our minor roads. The majority of the balance is allocated for grants to help maintain the churchyards in Brinsop and Mansel Lacy as well as a contribution to the cost of producing the Foxley News.

The Council has secured additional funding that will allow us to clear the vegetation and blockages for the ditches and drains of our minor roads. This will involve digging out the ditches and grips and jetting the culverts. This should prepare us for any heavy winter rain and work is due to take place around the end of October. This may involve some minor traffic disruption so please be patient if you come across a work site, it is in a good cause. Rob Hallett Clerk
