Community Association

The Community Association at this time of year is putting together a programme of events for the next few months. As this year is the Queen's ninetieth birthday we thought it would be a good excuse to have a party. We have decided to hold a barn dance with a hog roast and bar to add to the celebrations. As the Parish Council have kindly given us a grant the cost to the partygoers will be heavily subsidised. This is on Saturday the 18th June a week after the official birthday but in order to book the highly rated Whiffeldy band, the date has been moved, but I'm sure it won't affect the event. At the event we will collect subscriptions of £1.00 for membership of the Community Association and charge a small fee for the event. Everyone in the area of the Foxley group of Parishes is warmly welcomed. Please make a note of the date and let us know re tickets on 019081 590625. Before that we will be sending 100 plastic ducks down the stream on 20th May starting at 6.30pm followed by all those puddings to eat. The puddings will be organised as usual by Joyce & Mike Potts so please contact them with your offerings and remember we will pay for the ingredients, so don't be shy.

The path lights to the wide drive to the church have been repaired and a new sensor fitted over the porch door. The narrow path lights are still under investigation. Another couple of new sensors will be required to bring all the path lights back into full operation.

The infra red heater over the door of the church has been fitted with a new switch cord. There is an audible click when switching on, but an almost inaudible click when switching off, so be gentle and pull once, and watch the element go dull.

We have purchased 12 spira ground anchors, to hold down the new marquees in the strong winds that occasionally sweep this area.

We are investigating some upgrades to various elements of the Community Association's equipment. The churchyard shed is one of these in that it is in need of repair or replacement, most probably on a new concrete base. The boiler down in the basement is in a slightly damp environment and over the years had deteriorated in performance. Some parts are in need of replacement. Putting all these elements together there is a case for obtaining a grant to help communities such as ours, so research will be done in the hope of getting some money.

At the Community Association meeting on Monday 15th Feb. Plans for future events were discussed and it was decided to go ahead with a concert by Howdenjones. A duo from Lancashire who may have added a third player to the ensemble. See the Advert on page 24 and book your tickets early please. There will be refreshments available during the interval. The last time they were here the response was excellent from the audience.

The yellow ducks are coming out of storage for more adventures down the stream. The races will take place on Friday May 20. Starting at 6.30pm from Brookside. One of the attractions of this evening is the sumptuous puddings organised by Joyce & Mike Potts, which follow afterwards.

The wind rattled around Mansel Lacy Community Hall, but our brave gardeners settled down to listen to Tamsin Westhorpe of Stocktonbury Gardens, Kimbolton, Hereford, and watch her slides on 'Spring at Stocktonbury'. This was not a simple slide show, Tamsin also gave us some history of the original farm and garden, tips to make gardening easier, slides and advice about her favourite trees and shrubs, how to use the scenery outside your plot, and an outline of future plans. Tamsin's Uncle founded this 4 acre garden 30 years ago, prior to this, the garden was just used to feed the family, recently clearing out the stable they found garden diaries, planting plans, from 1905-1910, which are going to help the history timeline planned for the future. Tamsin is a garden journalist, often photographed for garden magazines performing various gardening tasks, and giving advice. Tamsin is gardener in charge at Stocktonbury, the family are called in as well. her husband mows the lawns, and Tamsin keeps the edges spick and span, finding this therapeutic, after long days gardening. New ideas still have to be 'approved' by her Uncle. Tamsin suggested members should garden all year, getting rid of weeds as soon as they shoot, slug pellets should go down on Valentine's Day, after all gardeners do love slugs, not great handfuls, just a few in your pots. Next meeting, Monday, 7th March, Julian Reeves will be talking about Growing Point. New members welcome, come as a visitor to see if you like us! Pam Powell


Would You like to be a Tree Warden?

Parish Councils and Town Wards can appoint a tree warden for their area and HTWN can offer support and training. HTWN is also affiliated to Herefordshire Wildlife Trust and the Herefordshire Tree Forum, which bring together statutory bodies and other local organisations and experts concerned with tree care policy.

Would YOU like to be a Tree Warden? You'd be offered on-going training on the welfare of trees, how to spot diseases, recognise & protect notable veterans and plant for the next generation. Tree Wardens also encourage an appreciation of trees and involve others in local tree events. Trees are increasingly valued not just for their timeless beauty and timber but also for their contribution to our wellbeing, flood prevention, air quality, biodiversity and as a source of renewable, sustainable energy.

Unfortunately you don't know if you'll be able to make it that far. You have been trained in CPR, but the guy that taught the course did not tell you how to perform it on yourself. HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK WHEN ALONE?

Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack without help, the person whose heart is beating improperly and who begins to feel faint, has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness. However, these victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest. A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let-up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it regain normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get to a hospital. Tell as many other people as possible about this. It could save their lives!! A cardiologist says If everyone who reads this and tells 10 people, you can bet that we'll save at least one life.

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A famous writer was in his study. He picked up his pen and began writing: ** Last year, my gall bladder was removed. I was stuck in bed due to this surgery for a long time. ** The same year I reached the age of 60 and had to give up my favourite job. I had spent 30 years of my life with this publishing company. ** The same year I experienced the death of my dear father. ** In the same year my son failed in his medical exam because he had a car accident. He had to stay in the hospital with a cast on his leg for several days. ** And the destruction of our car was a second loss. His concluding statement **Alas! It was such bad year!!"

When the writer's wife entered the room, she found her husband looking dejected, sad and lost in his thoughts. She carefully and surreptitiously read what he had written, and silently left the room and came back shortly with another piece of paper on which she had written her summary of the year's events and placed it beside her husband's paper. 
The man walks up to him and says, "I didn't know you were into earrings."

At the Group Parish meeting held on Wednesday 3rd February it was agreed to purchase the Red Telephone box in Mansel Lacy from BT for £1.00 and to possibly fit a Defibrillator and some shelves to hold a book exchange. The Defibrillator is held in a secure box. The unit supplied would be an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) which automates the diagnosis of treatable rhythms, meaning that lay responders or bystanders are able to use them successfully with little or no training.

The remaining space in the Telephone box could usefully be used by installing shelves and operating a free book exchange.

The Parish Council have made a grant from the Amenity fund towards a celebration of Her Majesty's 90th Birthday on 11 June. It is proposed by the Community Association to hold a Barn Dance in Mansel Lacy on 18 June to include hog roast and a bar. (See Page 3).

Bonus Ball scheme

As neighbouring villages, on 2nd August 2003 the Bonus Ball Fundraising scheme started in Mansel Lacy. Though not all 49 numbers have been owned continuously the system has worked to produce a regular income for the 2 village charities - Community Association and PCC. When 49 numbers were owned it produced an income of £2548 a year with £25 a week paid out to the owner of the Saturday National Lottery Lotto Bonus Ball making £1300 a year. The remaining £24 a week totalling £1248 a year was shared between the CA and PCC. The Treasurers receive cheques on 1st January and 1st July. On 10th October 2015 the organisers decided to increase the numbers to 59 and we decided to retain the former Bonus Ball structure and offer numbers 50 to 59. Annual figures would show an income of £3068, £25 a week winnings still £1300 with £34 a week amounting to £1768 meaning each charity would receive £884 each - depending on all 59 numbers being owned.

Already people have been prepared to take a second number and new people have stepped forward so that now THERE ARE JUST 6 NUMBERS WAITING TO BE OWNED...

The CA and PCC run the last publicly owned building in the village - the church. This is important as a working heart of our community. The costs involved still climb with heating oil, electricity, water and insurance- this latter is very high because of the need to cover public liability. Then the churchyard must be looked after so the mower must be regularly serviced and replaced as occurred recently. One dreads the day when the quinquennial inspection announces we need a new roof!

Dear Friends.

In 1983 Mehmet Ali Agca was in the middle of the crowd in St. Peter's Square in Rome when he pulled a gun out of his pocket and tried to assassinate Pope John Paul II. He was arrested and imprisoned. In January 1984 the Pope visited the prison, and when he walked through the cell door, he said to the young man, "I forgive you." The papers in the city of Rome made much of it, but one editorial writer made a significant statement. "Of course the Pope forgives the man who tried to kill him. After all, he is the Pope, and forgiveness is his business."

Strangely enough, what he said about the Pope is true about us. Forgiveness is the business of every Christian. But forgiveness is in short supply in our culture, although it is terribly needed. We often bury the hatchet with people, but then we keep a road map of exactly where we buried it. We put our resentments in cold storage, but we're ready to let them thaw out again whenever we need them. We take the cancelled note, tear it up and say, "They don't owe us anything anymore," but then we hang onto the bits of paper. We often talk about forgiveness more than we forgive.

One of the reasons forgiveness is so important is that it heals our souls to be 'forgiving people'. Harbouring un-forgiveness is more damaging to ourselves than to the person who hurt us in the first place. Whenever we say the 'Lord's Prayer' we ask God to 'forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us'. If we want God to forgive us, then we must first forgive those who hurt us. This Lent I hope that we can all find it in our hearts to forgive those who have done or said things that hurt us. Then we can approach the cross at Easter joyfully knowing that Jesus' death was the means for our broken relationship with God to be healed and restored completely, just as our relationships with those who've hurt us can be healed and restored.
