

He would always help you. He died on Thursday 2nd February peacefully at the County Hospital, Hereford. I'm delighted to inform you that your application for one Zoll AED Plus defibrillator, one Aivia 200 cabinet and a Call Push Rescue Training Kit, has been approved. Please note the cabinet(s) are provided unlocked and without key-codes. Unfortunately, we are unable to consider requests for alternative versions. This award has been funded by the Department of Health. As you will have noted in your application, we ask under Section 7, Governance that you have arrangements in place regarding the checking and maintenance of the defibrillator, ensuring the pads and batteries are in date and it is ready to use at all times. The link below will take you to a document entitled "A Guide to Automated External Defibrillators" produced in conjunction with the Resuscitation Council (UK) we ask that the advice regarding the maintenance of the AED as set out in Section 13 is adhered to.

"The Good, the Bad and the Ugly" by Philip Marshall 2nd January 2017 We welcomed the first meeting of the New Year with a glass of much appreciated mulled wine. A new year and perhaps a new way of gardening for some of us as Philip, an ecologist from Clehonger, talked about gardening with wildlife in mind.

He showed us slides of good insects that are beneficial to our garden like bees, ladybirds, lacewings and how to encourage them by growing the kind of plants and flowers that they thrive on and giving them plenty of places in our garden for them to live. They will reward us by eating the bad insects like vine weevils and slugs and snails that damage our plants and vegetables without us having to use pesticides and slug pellets that damage our environment. The ugly referred to a too tidy garden with an immaculate lawn and large double boomed flowers that insects cannot enter to find nectar. A small area of longer grass and wildflowers together with a pile of logs or rocks will encourage good wildlife into our garden. Philip is very passionate about wildlife and he enthusiastically answered our many questions over tea and refreshments.

"Michaelmas Daisies" by Helen Picton Monday 6th February 2017

Helen Picton is the third generation of Old Court Nurseries and The Picton Garden, a family run business and home of the Plant Heritage National Collection of autumn flowering asters. They specialise in breeding and growing Michaelmas daisies and have a collection of over 420 varieties. Helen learned her trade from her father and has a degree in botany. She talked to us about the different classes of aster, New York asters, European asters, species & hybrid asters and the inevitable class labelled as 'others'!

She showed us slides of the many colours available, the range of growing heights, different flower head sizes and how to grow and look after them.

I am also sad to have lost a good friend and spiritual companion in Clifford Knight. In addition to being my vicar, he was my training incumbent and we worked very closely together. Cliff was a Godly, deeply spiritual man who had a wonderful way of getting alongside people and helping them thorough their difficulties. He understood what it is to be human and had great empathy whilst having just the right thing to say or do to bring comfort and help.

Many of us remember his beautiful singing voice. I was reminded that he sang the Welsh song 'Calon Lan' (which is translated 'a pure heart') at a Welshman's funeral in Bishopstone and he sometimes sang as part of a sermon. Cliff was a spontaneous preacher who often commented on current events in a helpful way. He worked hard to bring our 6 parishes together to operate as a United Benefice and was totally dedicated to God and the people in his parishes.

During his time with us he celebrated 40 years as a priest, having begun in Swansea then as a Royal Air Force Chaplain after which he served in Lincoln before coming to us. The benefice held a surprise party for him as he'd said he didn't want to make a fuss and we collected enough money to send Cliff and Diana away for a weekend treat. I remember his talking afterwards about the weekend and importance of making memories.

Cliff came to our group of parishes as his last appointment and we all benefited from his life and work experiences. His last few years after retirement were a struggle as his health failed but even when he was seriously ill he always asked about the folks he cared for and greeted those looking after him by asking how they were. He died as he had lived, peacefully putting himself into God's hands. He is badly missed by family and friends but it is good to know that the struggle is over. He died on the feast of Candlemas, when we celebrate the presentation of Christ in the Temple in Jerusalem. The collect for the day is very pertinent to Clifford as part of it reads:

Almighty and ever-living God......grant that we may be presented to you with pure and clean hearts, by your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.... I am sure he has been!

All parents know that those years before children go off to school and then college are vital in a child's life and having a good start at home is of utmost importance – but we also know things don't run smoothly all the time.



Before they are matched with a family, an initial recruitment policy is adhered to. All new prospective volunteers attend a course of preparation, have an enhanced criminal records check, and references to support their application.

Volunteers give 2-3 hours a week to visit a family. In return our volunteers find that they have fun, feel rewarded and honoured that they are allowed into the life of a family. Our volunteers are given excellent training and support, a chance to join in with our social events and all out of pocket expenses are paid.

Bonus Question: Is Hell exothermic (gives off heat) or endothermic (absorbs heat)? Most of the students wrote proofs of their beliefs using Boyle's Law (gas cools when it expands and heats when it is compressed) or some variant. One student, however, wrote the following:


