Short Eared owl (Asio Flammeus) going to write about something that here in our beautiful little village that A bird, mammal or maybe a reptile little slow worms that are abundant the snow one afternoon completely



For my first article I was would be quite common everyone would of seen. such as our exceptional here. But then a walk in changed my mind.

After about an hour and half of walking through foot deep snow I decided it was time to go home. A chance look up and I saw flying overhead a large bird which I very quickly realised was an owl. I managed to take a few photos before it flew too far away. But it played on my mind as it was very pale underneath but was definitely not a Barn Owl. It must be a pale Tawny Owl as the only other owls we have apart from them in the area are little owls and it was definitely not one of those. Maybe the snow has forced it to hunt in the day or the shooting I heard earlier disturbed it. Either way it bothered me I couldn't positively ID it.

So once back home I emailed a man I know from Hereford BTO. I said I'd seen what looks like a Tawny Owl flying in the day, and would this be usual because of the harsh weather we had been having. He replied that yes he did think it unusual and can he have a photo. Once I sent the zoomed in photo I got a very excited reply almost straight away explaining what I had seen was not a Tawny but a Short Eared Owl. Also that only one or two are recorded each year in the whole of Herefordshire. When I looked them up I could see immediately the difference between them. Its very pale underneath and the wings are smooth edged but with quite obvious markings They have tufts of feathers resembling ears which are sometimes visible when in a defensive pose. It is one of the most widespread of any bird but that has not stopped its decline like most wildlife they are now struggling and they are of European concern and so have been placed on the Amber list. During the winter the UK has an influx of continental birds from Iceland, Scandinavia and Russia. They are normally limited to Northern and Eastern Uk and the Southern English coastline. Its very nomadic compared to other Owls and will move to other areas depending on rodent population. They prefer voles and they will hunt more during daylight if there is a higher vole density. When it nests it does so on the ground in nests concealed by low vegetation. If any predator comes close they will lure them away by appearing to have an injured wing! If you are lucky enough to see one please let the Hereford Ornithology club know. Angela Starling

Highways: During 2017, good progress was made on improving the overall condition of the Parish Roads. Balfour Beatty resurfaced or patched the worst sections of the A480 and also have improved the drainage from Yazor down to Westmoor. After the severe weather, thanks to the willing co-operation of the landowner, hedges and trees have been cut back, and drainage improved as well, at Ladybank. Our lengthsman has been kept busy on general maintenance of our minor roads including verge trimming and sign cleaning, whilst in March a day was spent filling the worst of the potholes caused by the wintry weather. Attention to the surface of the road from Brinsop Turn and the Weobley to Tillington Road was also completed

For 2018, the Parish Council will maintain close co-operation with Balfour Beatty through their Locality Steward to keep our roads in good condition. 20 bags of Viafix pothole filler have been ordered to deal with outstanding holes in the Parish, the work to be undertaken in June and August. All our roads are inspected once a month,

both by Balfour Beatty and the Parish Council, but please let the Clerk know of any defects you are aware of. (brianbarrett99@btinternet.com)

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

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
