"The Wonderful World of Perennial Violas" by Jack Willgoss 7th November

Our speaker for November was Jack Willgoss from Wildgoose Nursery, Millichope Park, Munslow, Shropshire. Jack and his wife, Laura hold the largest collection of hardy perennial and scented violas in the UK. Jack told us that when they were both students at RHS Wisley they dreamed of owning their own beautiful garden and nursery. The dream started to come true in 2011 when Mark and Stephanie Roberts, who owned the Bouts collection of violas, retired and after persuading Jack's parents that it was a good investment they took over the collection. Jack talked about the struggle they had before eventually finding a home for the collection at the ideal walled garden at Millichope Park. An 1830's curvelinear glasshouse has been restored, the weeds have been tamed and Jack and Laura have their dream.

RHS gold medalists at Malvern 2014 and 2015 and RHS silver gilt medalists at Chelsea 2015 is proof of their hard work and dedication. Jack showed us slides of some of the many violas they have and with great enthusiasm convinced us that we must try them. He left us with a tempting catalogue and with a challenge of which variety to choose! Pam

Mike founded the Hospice Angels in 2003 which is a group of people who combine the love of motor bikes and fund raising for the Hospice. Mike is nearing his 80th birthday and hopes to have raised £80,000 by then. A very interesting and enjoyable evening.

September: Maureen Williams visited us to talk about her love of hedgehogs. Five years ago someone brought her a baby hedgehog which they had found on it's own. Since then she has looked after many abandoned and injured . Every morning Maureen weighs each hedgehog and charts it's weight; she cleans the cage and renews the bedding and gives them their food. She then washes all their bedding. The hedgehogs are fed again at lunchtime and in the evening. She re-homes the hedgehogs into a safe environment where there are no badgers because they will kill them. The hedgehogs are fed meatloaf, dog food, meal worms, cat biscuits and the very small ones get a special powdered food. This summer, at one time, she had 40 inmates including two mothers with babies which had been found on a building site. A full time job caring for all these animals. Maureen brought along for us to see, a baby hedgehog called Lucy who was found at Holme Lacy. A very caring lady.

October: Sarah from Just Rachel Ice cream came to talk to us. She said that Ice Cream goes back to Egyptian times when snow was gathered and mixed with fruit and berries, It has evolved down though the ages. Just Rachel was started in the 1980's by a lady called Rachel. Sarah's family now own the farm, their ice cream contains cream, sugar and fruit. All the ingredients are sourced locally and it does not contain preservatives.

Foxley News Speed Of Change

In 1998, Kodak had 170,000 employees and sold 85% of all photo paper worldwide. Within just a few years, their business model disappeared and they went bankrupt. What happened to Kodak will happen in a lot of industries in the next 10 year - and most people don't see it coming. Did you think in 1998 that 3 years later you would never take pictures on paper film again? Yet digital cameras were invented in 1975. The first ones only had 10,000 pixels, but followed Moore's law, so as with all exponential technologies, it was a disappointment for a long time, before it became way superior and got mainstream in only a few short years. It will now happen with Artificial Intelligence, health, autonomous and electric cars, education, 3D printing, agriculture and jobs.

Software will disrupt most traditional industries in the next 5 -10 years. Uber is just a software tool, they don't own any cars, and are now the biggest taxi company in the world. Airbnb is now the biggest hotel company in the world, although they don't own any properties.

Artificial Intelligence: Computers become exponentially better in understanding the world. This year, a computer beat the best Go player in the world, 10 years earlier than expected.

Autonomous Cars: In 2018 the first self-driving cars will appear publicly. Around 2020, the complete industry will start to be disrupted. You don't want to own a car anymore. You will call a car with your phone, it will show up at your location and drive you to your destination. You will not need to park it, you only pay for the driven distance and can be productive while driving. Our kids will never get a driver's license and will never own a car. It will change the cities, because we will need 90-95% less cars for that. We can transform former parking space into parks. 1.2 million people die each year in car accidents worldwide. We now have one accident every 100,000 km, with autonomous driving that will drop to one accident in 10 million km. Traditional car companies try the evolutionary approach and just build a better car, while tech companies (Tesla, Apple, Google) will do the revolutionary approach and build a computer on wheels. I spoke to a lot of engineers from Volkswagen and Audi; they are terrified of Tesla. Electric cars will become mainstream in 2020.

Electricity: will become incredibly cheap and clean: Solar production has been on an exponential curve for 30 years, but you can only now see the impact. Last year, more solar energy was installed worldwide than fossil fuels. The price for **solar** will drop so much that all coal companies will be out of business by 2025. With cheap electricity comes cheap and abundant water. Desalination now only needs 2kWh per cubic meter. We don't have scarce **water** in most places, we only have scarce drinking water. Imagine what will be possible if we can have as much clean water as we want, at almost no cost.

Health: The Tricorder X price will be announced this year. There will be companies who will build a medical device (called the "Tricorder" from Star Trek) that works with your phone. It scans your retina, your blood sample and you breathe into it. It then analyses 54 biomarkers that will identify nearly any disease. It will be so cheap, that in a few years everyone on this planet will have access to world class medicine, almost free.

Agriculture: There will be a \$100 agricultural robot in the future. Farmers in 3rd world countries can then become managers of their fields instead of working all day on their fields. Hydroponics will need much less water. Imagine if we don't need that space anymore. There are several startups which will bring insect protein to the market shortly. They contain more protein than meat. It will be labeled as an "**alternative protein source**" because most people still reject the idea of eating insects.

Longevity: Right now, the average life span increases by 3 months per year. Four years ago, the life span used to be 79 years, now it's 80 years. The increase itself is increasing and by 2036, there will be more than a year in longevity increase per year. So we all might live for a long, long time, probably over a 100 years.
