Mansel Garden Club

Talk by Victoria Logue – "The Highs and Lows of Growing Vegetables"

Growing vegetables is not easy especially if you are a beginner, but Victoria talked us through the basics and the problems that we might come up against. Choose a sunny, sheltered spot, remove weeds and add compost or manure. It is easy to get carried away and grow too much so the size of the plot is determined by how many vegetables you can eat in a season. Only grow vegetables you like to eat. If space is limited consider growing dwarf varieties or even using containers.

Do not sow too many seeds at a time, it is really difficult to eat 15 lettuces in a week so sow few and often. This, of course, applies to all the vegetables you grow in order to avoid a glut.

Now we have to protect our precious seedlings from slugs, snails, caterpillars, aphids, white fly, pigeons, frost, wind, blight and even your own cat! Don't give up as Victoria explained many remedies for dealing with these small problems, just think about the joy and satisfaction of eating your home grown vegetables.

Should you have a major disaster all you have to do is put the offending vegetables in the compost bin and coming next month to the garden club is a talk on composting by Sue Mabberley.

The April meeting, held at Mansel Community Hall, subject Compost. Some members showed disinterest, wondered how anyone could talk for an hour about Compost. Sue Mabberley did just that, she arrived with samples of her compost, we soon realised how very important good compost is, that it does take time, but the rewards are so worthwhile. Sue gave us a step by step guide but included information about her garden, her plants, her successes and failures. Compost was the backdrop to success. Sue has gardened at Nant-y-Bedd, Gwyne Fawr, Abergavenny, NP7 7LY, for 41 years, at over 1000 feet the garden is challenging, more rainfall, spring arrives late, her garden is open to the public.

Sue has featured in Garden magazine, Country House and Gardens, Alan Titchmarsh has visited with his team. The garden is a partner RHS Garden in Wales, browse her web site for further information.

Sue was inspirational, and hopefully inspired members to get composting.

The May meeting at The Old Corn Mill, Aston Crews, Ross on Wye, HR9 7LW, was nearly out of county, it is becoming harder to find gardens we have not visited. Parking at the farmyard, less able could drive the steep drive down to the house. 22 members and friends walked down the woodland path to find the beautifully converted Old Corn Mill in the bottom, surrounded by garden.

Jill Hunter initially planted around a 1000 trees on this 4 acre plot, also retaining some of the originals, shrubs were chosen for all year interest, grasses and ferns flourish, the majority of plants from gifted cuttings. Nesting boxes to encourage birds, a stream quietly meandering The Old Mill pond looking very much as it must have originally. Stunning Acers, a wild meadow, which leads to an adjoining field where sheep graze.
